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Australian women's experiences of economic abuse

He made me go on the single parent payment so that if he felt like not working, or if we had a fight or whatever, I'd have money. We'd often have a fight and he'd disappear for two days, go through his money and come back two days later and rely on my money. But I was being made to take the risk there; being with him and being on the single parenting pension and **he'd threaten me, "well I'm going to go and tell Centrelink."**

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Once the domestic violence order was in place, he just refused to pay any of the bills for our house.

The car rego was due, but **the registration was in his name, and he was refusing to register it.** We'd bought the car together but it was registered in his name and I was using it to get around with our baby. I tried to do the rego myself, but I needed his licence number.

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Economic abuse across the response continuum

Universal services: federal government agencies, utilities, banks

Employers, state governments, community, cultural and faith groups

Health, family and community services

Specialist domestic, family and sexual violence services

Statutory services: Police, Courts, Child Protection, Legal

Joint name on mortgage but only perps name on title

Forced to claim single rate of social security

Employment sabotage


Withholding money for offering at Church or Temple

Withholding money for medical treatment, after refusing to get private health insurance

Forced to leave home (shelter) for safety with no money, possessions, paperwork

Joint accounts cleared as soon as domestic violence order in place


Use of lawyers to create costs (esp. Family Law)



Economic abuse: a key focus area of Australia's National Plan

- Address financial stress as a major priority for women leaving an abusive relationship
- Develop a nationally consistent definition of financial abuse
- Train more financial specialists about financial abuse and its effects
- Adopt a holistic approach to addressing financial abuse, including working with banks, credit, utility and housing providers and welfare services
- Build evidence on the types of financial abuse experienced by different women and children, including the intersections with forms of technology-facilitated abuse.

How Australian banks are responding to financial abuse






